MARIA ACKRÉN

Maria Ackrén is an associate professor in political science at Ilisimatusarfik/University of Greenland. She has worked there since 2011, but she has also taught and researched at Åbo Akademi in Finland since 2005 and been a guest lecturer at Mid Sweden University in Östersund in Sweden. Her research profile is focused on autonomous areas in the world with a special focus on the Nordic autonomous territories Greenland, the Faroe Islands and Åland. Maria is also interested in international relations in an Arctic/Greenlandic context, island studies, regional parties and qualitative methods. Her research is typically in the area between comparative and international politics. She is active in the following networks: UArctic Network on Geopolitics and Security, Global Research Network on Comparative Territorial Autonomies and similar networks. Maria is also an associate professor at Åbo Akademi in Finland and an affiliated researcher at Åland's Peace Institute, the Institute of International Affairs and its Research Centers, the Center for Small State Studies and the Center for Arctic Policy Studies at the University of Iceland. She has participated in various Nordic and international projects.



ELISABETH ALBER

Elisabeth Alber leads the research group Participation and Innovations at the Eurac Research Institute for Comparative Federalism, and the program Eurac Research Federal Scholar. At the University of Innsbruck, she lectures on law and policy-making in federal systems. Her latest publications include Federalism and constitutionalism: a relation based on interdependency (2023), Federalism and Ethnic Relations (2022), Language realities and policies in Italy (2022), an edited volume on direct and deliberative democracy in European multilevel systems (2021) and South Tyrol's Model of Conflict Resolution: Territorial Autonomy and Power-Sharing (2021). Elisabeth holds external associate positions at the Centre for Deliberative Democracy and Global Governance at the University of Canberra and the Centre for Multilevel Federalism of the Institute of Social Sciences in New Delhi. She is a member of the Scientific Committees of the KDZ-Centre for public administration research and the Alexander Langer Foundation. As co-convenor of the IACL-Research Group Constitutionalism and Societal Pluralism, she coordinated the IACL blog symposium Constitutionalism and Pluralism in Overseas France (2020).
